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### **AUTHOR'S NOTE**

It's crazy to me to think that five years ago, my husband and I were plotting a wild 50-state honeymoon across America. It was even crazier to my mom, who had some serious doubts about how her 23-year-old daughter and her *obviously* crazy fiancé would support themselves on the road. Even our best friends would later tell us they expected us to make it maybe halfway across the country before we ended up broke and returned home.

But we had the kind of confidence only twenty-somethings can have and always said "We'll figure it out!"

Running a business from an RV wasn't what we pictured ourselves doing fresh out of college, but we quickly fell in love with travel and knew we wanted to find a way to keep traveling as long as possible.

We tried a little bit of everything to stay afloat. Freelance writing, video production, consulting, marketing, even planning a thirty city book tour for an author (because who knew America like the two kids who just drove across every inch of it?). After 18 months of freelancing to pay the bills, we created our first official business: Padgett Creative LLC, a digital marketing agency that combined all our skills.

As we were growing our business from the road, we felt really lonely. Surely we weren't the only couple out there struggling to build a business from an RV? We desperately wanted to connect with others who were just as crazy as us.

Around this time, my husband Heath decided to start a podcast called The RV Entrepreneur. On the show, he would interview other RVers like us who are running a business from their tiny home on wheels. He then created The RV Entrepreneur Facebook group where our new community could ask questions, get advice, and find work.

Through the podcast and the Facebook group we found our people. Bold adventurers who wanted more than just to travel, but to build a business that support their lifestyle and made a difference.

In this ebook, I share different types of businesses we've seen run by RVers, a few of the skills you need to run them, and links to the relevant podcast episodes so you can dive deep and learn more about what businesses interest you.

Use this short ebook like a reference guide for discovering what type of mobile business you might want to create, or for finding inspiration and encouragement to chase after your dream.

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### INTRODUCTION

People ask our Facebook group all the time "how do people actually make money on the road?" It's a complicated question, to which I normally answer "Check out our RV Entrepreneur Podcast. There are 100+ interviews with full-time RVers there!" It's a pretty lazy answer, but there are so many options for how to make money on the road, it's a hard question to answer!

I've always been a little curious to figure out what all types of businesses we've seen run by RVers. So we looked through every published podcast episode and wrote down every single type of business run by full-timers.

Some are freelance gigs, like project management or writing. Some are full-time businesses with employees like web design or a virtual assistant company. And then there are ones you wouldn't expect like jewelry designer, mural artist, or the growing in popularity voice-over actor.

In this ebook, I'll share a little bit about each type of business, plus where you can learn more about how to start your own similar business.

### **But Before We Jump In...**

I've done a bit of research for each of these types of businesses trying to identify the top skills you need to succeed. But beyond needing the proper equipment to work as a voiceover artist or being fluent in HTML to be a web developer, there are a few universal skills you'll also need to be successful at whichever business you choose

### What Skills You Need for Any Business:

- To show up every day
- To legally set up your business (see <u>episode 115 of the podcast</u> for expert advice from Heather Ryan, EA)
- · Basic accounting and record keeping knowledge
- Computer skills, including using gMail, Google docs, social media, etc.
- A website
- A solid internet connection
- A laptop, desktop, or iPad
- Self-motivation and resiliency
- To be a life-long learner
- To be okay with working alone
- To never be afraid to ask for help or support
- A financial runway and/or to be prepared for slow or inconsistent income, especially early on
- A community or mastermind to support and encourage you
- To believe you can totally do this (cause you can)

There are a lot of other things you'll need as you grow your business—like learning sales and pricing strategies and how to network with professionals in your industry and so on—but these are the skills you need to get started.

Now you just have to figure out what type of business you want to create...

### WRITER

### **Job Description**

Someone who writes books, stories, articles, or professional blogs for their full-time income (AKA the #1 dream job we hear).

### What You Need for this Business:

- Kick butt writing skills
- Confidence to market yourself
- A killer portfolio
- Mastery of grammar, spelling, and punctuation
- Resilience in the face of rejection

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Writing for a living looks different for every writer. Mike Wendland is a journalist and travel writer. Mike & Crissa Boyink write for online publications and RV-related blogs. Many writers are also bloggers (see section three for more on bloggers), but writers will often find paid work with magazines, newspapers, major blogging sites, or as a freelancer.

### 2 PHOTOGRAPHER

### **Job Description**

Artists with cameras capturing events, landscapes, people, products, etc.

### A Few Skills You Need for this Business:

- A great artistic eye
- Knowledge and mastery of camera equipment
- Confidence to market and sell yourself
- A killer portfolio
- Fantastic interpersonal skills
- Photo editing, typically using Adobe

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Most photographers we meet start as wedding or studio photographers. Joe Hendricks was a sought-after wedding photographer in Nashville before he starting selling photos to Airstream™ and major magazines during his travels. Peter & Kathy Holcombe had a studio in Boulder but now are adventure photographers in the kayaking industry.

# 3 MUSICIAN

### **Job Description**

Performing music for live audiences. May also include song-writing or recording EPs or albums.

### A Few Skills You Need for this Business:

- Proficiency in at least one instrument (preferably one that can fit in an RV!)
- Crazy passion for music and performance
- Persistence and perseverance
- Confidence and flexibility

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Amy and Brad of Winnie Brave travel in their Winnebago Brave playing shows across the country. They found that planning a tour with stops ahead of time helped grow their following. Or there's Eric who has written over two hundred songs while traveling the world in both a sailboat and a converted bus.

### 4 VOICE-OVER

### **Job Description**

Recording voice-over audio for commercials, television shows, movies, or audio-based programming.

### What You Need for this Business:

- A gorgeous voice—ideally one that makes people want to buy whatever you're likely selling
- Control and clarity of voice
- Technical knowledge of audio recording equipment
- Confidence to market yourself

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Voiceover acting is becoming more and more popular for RVers, even becoming a side hustle or hobby for many. Carrie Olsen recorded ads and commercials for REI while traveling in her trailer. Tim Paige is a voice actor who has done work for companies like The Travel Channel, Jimmy Kimmel, UFC, and NBC. Both recommend signing up for an online marketplace of voice actors to find consistent gigs.

# 5 ETSY

### **Job Description**

Etsy is an online platform for creators to sell a range of handmade products as well as vintage items or even craft supplies.

### A Few Skills You Need for this Business:

- Creating (or finding) awesome products
- Taking high-quality photos of your products
- Shipping your orders out in a timely fashion
- Exceptional customer service
- Killer marketing skills

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Sam of Mugsy Supply House sells mugs with adorable dogs on them that she designs herself and Ane paints custom portraits of family pets. Note to self: pet-themed products must do well! If you're not a creator, Kyle & Olivia started a side business selling paper products, like maps and old photos, they would find for cheap at garage sales.

# 6 DROPSHIPPING

### **Job Description**

Dropshipping is where you sell a product via a third party so you keep no physical inventory (perfect for when you live in a tiny RV!).

### What You Need for this Business:

- A stellar product (or products)
- Great customer service
- Search Engine Optimization (SEO) and an optimized product page
- A well-defined, profitable niche

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

David Couillard is a digital strategist and works with brands and businesses helping them build and maintain websites. But he also owns two other companies—a dog poop bag business and a hard camera case dropshipping business. He runs his dropshipping business while traveling around the country with his family in their Airstream, since the beauty of this business is that you have no inventory to manage while you're on the road.

## COFFEE ROASTERS

### **Job Description**

Just like it sounds, RVers are taking coffee on the road, selling and even roasting it all from their van. Yum!

### What You Need for this Business:

- So much knowledge about coffee
- Proper equipment and relevant permits or licensing
- Create ways to promote your product

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

The Javazen Coffee team was talking with an investor who said if they really want to push their coffee in supermarkets, they needed to hit the road and go meet their customers face to face. So the whole team hopped into an RV and coordinated a cross-country tour visiting Wegman Grocery Stores. Each day they'd roll into a new town, meet customers, share their product, and build new passionate fans.

Or there's Vanabond Coffee who just recently hit the road with their coffee roasting company, selling and shipping coffee straight from their van.

# 8 RETAIL ARBITRAGE

### **Job Description**

Ah, retail arbitrage. The art of finding items at local stores or even garage sales that you can flip for a profit. Formally very popular on eBay, but commonly seen on Amazon these days.

### What You Need for this Business:

- An understanding of how Amazon works and what products perform well
- Patience shopping around for the right products
- Shipping your orders out in a timely fashion

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Jason Wyatt is a full-time RVer and retail arbitrage specialist. Jason compares retail arbitrage to treasure hunting and spends time searching yard sales for books that he can buy for \$3 and flip for \$50. He says "This business is great for RVers because you can bring in good income and you don't have to hold inventory. You can travel from place to place looking for product and then ship from anywhere. It's a completely location-free business."

### **Job Description**

### What You Need for this Business:

- A super awesome product people will pay for
- A professional website and the skills to run it
- A ton of web traffic plus great SEO

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Katie and Eric run MountainModernLife.com, a blog and online store dedicated to lifestyle and design. Katie put her background in design to use when she created her own custom wedding invitation. She uploaded the design of her wedding invitation to her blog and people loved it. They loved it so much they started asking her to make modifications to the invitation for their own weddings. Inspired, she turned their site into a marketplace for editable, printable designs.

- Fabulous writing skills
- An audience to market your book to
- Expertise in a certain area

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Chris and Cherie of Technomadia are a great example of taking your expertise and putting it all in a book. Each year, they release updated versions of The Mobile Internet Handbook, detailing all their research on finding a great internet connection on the road. (Talk about something you need for any mobile business!)

- Knowledge on how to operate a Wordpress website
- Sensational writing skills and a story to share
- SEO, consistent traffic, and a growing email list
- A diverse set of income streams

### A Few Skills You Need for this Business:

- Sensational writing skills
- Great photography or video skills
- An understand and mastery of social media
- Great interpersonal skills

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Cees and Madison took off on a 59 National Park tour with a plan to fund the trip with sponsors. It's the dream, right? But they actually made it happen because they create AMAZING content. From taking gorgeous photos and growing a huge Instagram following to creating videos and publishing blogs. You have to be a bit of a jack of all trades to succeed here, but if you love creating content, this is a pretty sweet gig.

- Film editing skills, including audio editing and color correction
- A good understanding of how Youtube works

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

After blogger, this is the most popular dream job. There are few different approaches you can take. The RV Geeks (Ep. 27) share incredibly helpful videos that can help you fix your awning or install solar. Or there's Nathan and Marissa (Ep. 47) who are "vloggers" and share their adventures on the road. Most of the Youtubers we've met make money from Youtube ads, but supplement income in the form of products, sponsors, or services.

- A specific niche that your podcast focuses on (the more narrow, the better!)

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Mike Wendland is a journalist who runs The RV Podcast where he covers a range of topics all related to RVing—from where you can park overnight for free to recent manufacturer products or acquisitions. In 2010, Kimberly and her husband Chris founded Fulltime Families, which is a website created to provide solutions to the questions and challenges of full time traveling families (They recently sold the business in 2018). FT families offers a few perks, namely a huge online community where families hitting the road and post questions, get advice, and make new friends.

# 16 CPA

### **Job Description**

A Certified Public Account or CPA is certified accountant handling taxes and accounting.

### What You Need for this Business:

- Pass the Uniform CPA exam as well as any additional state certification requirements where you plan on practicing
- The ability to explain complicated tax or accounting issues to clients
- Excellent time management, since CPA work is heavier in certain seasons of the year

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

There are some businesses you wouldn't expect to travel well and tax accountant would be one of them. But Adam Nubern and his wife wanted to travel, so he adapted his business to travel with them. Now Adam specializes in helping other travelers file their taxes, specifically RVers.

- Above-and-beyond amazing customer service skills
- A sense of humor (not required, but it makes the job easier!)

Our friends Eric & Brittany of RV Wanderlust are masters of social media, running multiple social accounts for clients on the road. ### What You Need for this Business:

- Excellent communication and negotiation skills
- Good team management and leadership
- Great organizational and time management skills
- To quickly identify and solve problems

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Abigail Schilling uses Upwork to pick up freelance work for her project management services. One of the hardest things about managing a freelance business like Abigail is standing out against the competition. In her podcast interview (Ep. 95), she shares how she made a killer Upwork profile, earned her first client, and uses reviews so she's more attractive to potential clients.

- Reliability to come through on the job
- Flexibility and adaptability based on your client's needs
- Proactive and a good learner

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Bryanna isn't just a virtual assistant—she's a Virtual Powerhouse. At least that's the name of her virtual assistance company where she offers services in social media, web design, email marketing, business coaching, and more. Virtual assistants need to be versatile, serving client needs quickly and learning whatever they need to know as they go. As Bryanna says "assistant" doesn't really cover it, because good VA should be more than just an assistant!

# 20 SE0

### **Job Description**

SEO, or search engine optimization, is the science of making sure a website shows up on Google and other search engines. SEO itself isn't exactly a job title, but people in this field will usually refer to themselves as SEO consultants or SEO experts.

### What You Need for this Business:

- An analytical mind for approaching problems
- Know how to run keyword research
- Speaking and writing skills
- Pulling, reading, and analyzing data
- Technical and programming skills (not required, but it helps!)

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

SEO isn't the sexiest business, but setting up your SEO can make or break a website. Since it can be a little complicated if you're not technically-savvy, more and more SEO experts are popping up to handle your SEO for you. Rich Charpentier creates high-end websites and develops SEO strategies for RV park. He's been traveling in his Airstream the past ten years while running his business.

### **Job Description**

Consultants are experts in a field who are hired to give advice.

### What You Need for this Business:

- Be an expert in something with years of experience
- Problem solving and analytical skills
- Fabulous interpersonal and communication skills
- Flexibility

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

I almost didn't include consulting in this book because I find it very hard to define since you can consult on almost any topic! But we've had Kyle Kesterson on the podcast twice sharing his brilliance on what consulting is like, and it's a popular option for freelancers.

Kyle Kesterson, is a storyteller, photographer, illustrator, and the founder of Freak n' Genius and Campfire. With his years of experience, now Kyle is a creative marketing consultant. Last year, we partnered with Kyle to consult with Winnebago for a product launch, helping to script videos, develop a launch plan, and market to new audiences.

### **Job Description**

Beyond just writing and beyond blogging, there's copywriting. Copywriters typically work for businesses and corporations focusing on writing website pages, advertisements, and brand messaging.

### A Few Skills You Need for this Business:

- Excellent writing skills especially in writing headlines
- Experience writing strong persuasive copy
- Up-to-date expertise in how to write copy that sells products
- A quick learner who can write copy on various topics (even when you're not an expert!)

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Marie runs Owl Eyes Creative where she works with nonprofits, small businesses and entrepreneurs to help them tell better stories. As a copywriter, it's her job to keep anyone who visits your website on the page, interested, and ultimately buying your product or service.

# 23 MARKETING

### **Job Description**

Marketing encompasses a wide range of strategies for promoting and selling products or services.

### A Few Skills You Need for this Business:

- Must be creative!
- Email and social media marketing expertise
- Ability to execute and analyze the effectiveness of campaigns
- Highly adaptable and excellent problem solving skills

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Pete and Jordan run a small boutique marketing agency focused on helping wedding professionals grow their business. They build websites, run experiments, and help their clients grown their reach on social media.

While a marketing agency nowadays isn't too different than the social media strategist we talked about earlier in this section, marketing is such a huge industry that it goes well beyond just managing social media. Most marketing agencies we see run on the road are focused specifically on digital marketing.

- Strategic and creative thinking
- Mastery of keyword optimization

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Bryanna, who I mentioned earlier runs Virtual Powerhouse, also runs Pinterest consulting services (and even has a course on Pinterest if you want to learn from her how to rock your own Pinterest consulting company). A good Pinterest consultant can boost web traffic as well as revenue for bloggers and other online businesses.

A content strategist is a copywriter who also plans company's website, blog, email, and sometimes social content.

### What You Need for this Business:

- Excellent long form writing skills that provide high ROI
- Can read and analyze analytics on multiple platforms
- To be able to write for diverse audiences
- A solid editorial strategy for content delivery and promotion
- SEO and keyword expertise

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Mark Cuda wanted to be more than just a freelance writer, so he learned how to create a full content strategy for his clients. In addition to writing for different company's websites and blogs, he also develops a strategy for growing the company's reach and extending the life of the content.

**SECTION 5** 

LIKE, YOU UNDERSTAND HOW THE INTERNET WORKS

### WEBSITE DEVELOPMENT

### **Job Description**

A programmer who creates websites, programs, and/or applications online. There are two main types of website developers: frontend and backend. - Training and experience with HTML and CSS
- Ways to get your app noticed and more visible in app stores

Kevin Holesh created Moment app, an app that measures how much time you spend on your phone that has been downloaded millions of times. But what I love about Kevin's story is that he created 10 apps before Moment took off. In such a highly competitive market, being an app developer means creating multiple products before finding the right app that will be successful.

Scott Blair created RV Health, a startup focused on providing telehealth solutions specifically created to focus on serving RVers. As a patient, you subscribe to a monthly membership to access your primary care physician as well as specialty doctors.

Most RVers aren't full-time, so instead of putting their RV in storage, they use an online rental company to rent their RV.

- A good profile on one of the main RV rental sites
- To be mentally okay with letting strangers drive away with your home on wheels

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

In 2016 Heath and I were experimenting with ways to make money on the road when we heard of Outdoorsy, a peer-to-peer RV rental company. We rent our RV out any time we know we won't be in the rig, for example when we fly home to visit family for the holidays or when we leave the country. We've rented our RV out on a few occasions and earned over \$5,000. (This is a great option I've seen soon-to-be full-timers use to make money before they hit the road!)

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Michael Boyink has done a LOT of camp hosting. For him, it's a great way to cut back on lodging expenses or stay in places where you normally couldn't stay for longer periods of time—like living as a camp host in Grand Teton National Park for a few months.

Please note: We do NOT recommend this as a way to make a full-time income. However, it is a great way to save money while you're building your own business.

They work in the "motorsports entertainment industry" traveling to events with their Fame Racing remote control car game. This interactive game (see the podcast page below to see a picture of their legit set-up!) allows people to compete in their own car races. They pack up everything they need in a trailer they tow behind their 52-foot rig.

- Someone to clean your home between guests (there are services that do this)
- Great photos of your space on your Airbnb profile
- Glowing reviews

### Who Runs This Type of Business?

Our friend Chris pays his mortgage and then some by renting his Nashville home out on Airbnb while he travels in his 19-foot motorhome. In his first eight months of renting on Airbnb, Chris earned over \$40,000.

She used Teachers Pay Teachers (TPT) to dabble in selling the crafts and activities she was already creating for her classroom. After quitting to RV full-time, Shae went all in on TPT working with her husband to create and sell digital products for teachers. They work part-time bringing in anywhere from \$1K-\$5K/month.
